According to the US Bishops, "Our world is hurting. We all need healing, yet many Catholics are separated from the very source of our strength – the Holy Eucharist."

The Mission of the National Eucharistic Revival is "To renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist."

Pope St. John Paul II, asserted that "the Rosary offers to us the 'secret' which leads easily to a profound and inward knowledge of Christ. We might call it Mary's way." Apostolic Letter Rosarium Virginis Mariae, (RVM) 24

Most non-practicing but self-described Catholics, influenced by our modern culture do not believe that, in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, the bread and wine actually become and remain the Body and Blood of Jesus. Saint Dominic faced a similar challenge to belief in Christ as the Incarnate Son of God and in his Sacraments. When all of his efforts to preach these truths failed, he turned in prayer to the Blessed Mother. She appeared to him saying:

Wonder not that you have obtained so little fruit by your labors, you have spent them on barren soil, not yet watered with the dew of Divine grace. When God willed to renew the face of the earth, He began by sending down on it the

renewal: the Angelic Psalter, the Most Holy Rosary. This ultimate prayer of supplication couples the Angelic Salutation with the prayer that Jesus himself taught to us, the Our Father. As he declared to his disciples, "No one comes to me unless the Father draws him." Jn 6:44.

Then the Blessed Mother inspired St. Dominic to 'preach the life of Christ' by adding to Mary's Psalter meditations on the Joyous, Sorrowful and Glorious events of His life. Pope St. John Paul II explains their power: "Mary constantly sets before the faithful the "mysteries" of her Son, with the desire that the contemplation of those mysteries will release all their saving power." RVM 11

From the moment of the Archangel's greeting, 'Hail full of grace', Mary lived with her eyes fixed on her Divine Son. The memories of Jesus, impressed upon her heart, were always with her, leading her to ponder, day by day, the events of his life as they unfolded before her. Our Holy Father declared, "In a way, those memories were to be the "rosary" which she recited uninterruptedly

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throughout her earthly life." RVM 11

As we pray the Rosary and recite each mystery, we unite ourselves with the memories and the contemplative gaze of Mary. By sitting peacefully with our Blessed Mother, we can 'see' the unfathomable riches of the mysteries of our Lord's life as through her eyes. Cf. RVM 12

No one has ever devoted himself to the contemplation of the face of Christ as faithfully as Mary. The eyes of her heart already turned to him at the Annunciation, when she conceived him by the power of the Holy Spirit. In the months that followed she began to sense his presence and to picture his features. When at last she gave birth to him in Bethlehem, her eyes were able to gaze tenderly on the face of her Son, as she "wrapped him in swaddling cloths, and laid him in a manger." Lk2:7 Cf. RVM 10

As we pray the Rosary and move from mystery to mystery, if we remember with his Mother each event of Christ's life, the gaze of our hearts will be conformed to hers. Beginning with her *gaze of adoration and wonder* at the Annunciation, our gaze



can become her *questioning* gaze at the finding in the Temple. Then, perhaps, we can match her penetrating gaze at the Wedding Feast at Cana, when she reads her Son's heart as she says to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." At the foot of the Cross, if our gaze

becomes her *gaze of stricken grief*, then on Easter morning it will become her *gaze radiant with the joy of the Resurrection*. Finally, pondering the day of Pentecost, our gaze may become her *gaze set afire* by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. *Acts* 1:14 Cf. *RVM* 10

As we pray the Rosary, power is released when our contemplation of the mysteries becomes a 'remembering' as the Eucharist is *a remembering*.

Remembrance in the biblical sense, *zakar* is a 'making present' of the works brought about by God in the history of salvation. The whole of the Bible is an account of these saving events culminating in Mystery of Christ himself. Events held in memory belong not only to "yesterday" they are also part of the "today" of salvation. *RVM* 13

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is a memorial. After saying, "this is my Body, this is my Blood," at the Last Supper, Jesus said "Do this in memory of me." The remembrance Jesus spoke of is not simply a "calling to mind" of a past event or the commemoration "in memory" of a person who has gone before us. This "remembrance" or "memorial" is "a living re-presentation before God, of the saving deeds he has accomplished in Christ, so that their fullness and power may be effective here and now." The Roman Missal © 2010: Introduction to the Order of the Mass, 121

Mary's contemplation was above all *a remembering*, a *zakar*, a making present. When we contemplate the mysteries of the Rosary with our Blessed Mother, we unite ourselves with her remembering. Because what God accomplished centuries ago did not only affect the direct witnesses of those events; it continues to affect people in every age with its gift of grace. Pope St. John Paul asserted, that to 'remember' the events of Salvation History in a spirit of faith and love is to be open to the grace which Christ won for us by the mysteries of his life, death and resurrection. Cf. RVM 13

St. Thomas Aquinas taught that contemplation is a type of knowledge that begins and ends in love; it is more experiential and intuitive than theoretical and discursive. *Cf. Summa Theologiae, Ila Ilae, q. 188* He describes it as a 'loving gaze' and St. John of the Cross speaks of it as the loving awareness of God. Jordan Aumann, O.P. Since according to Saint Thomas, "You cannot love what you do not know," we can depend on our Blessed Mother's loving gaze to lead us into a deeper knowledge of her Son one mystery at a time.

During this last year of preparation for the 2024 Eucharistic Congress, let us pray the Rosary together expecting our Father to draw many to Jesus, knowing that every Hail Mary will 'fertilize' hearts with the softening dew of Divine grace, and trusting that our contemplation of the holy mysteries will release their saving power.

Thus through our united prayer, we can trust that 'a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist, will be enkindled'

in every Catholic heart:

Mary's way!



THE ASTONISHING POWER OF ONE HAIL MARY

Have you ever prayed a quick Hail Mary, when someone asked for prayer, thinking, "Wow, I have just moved Heaven and Earth? Probably not. But perhaps these two stories will make you think

again. The first was told by Joe Petrovich to Father Freedy, senior parochial vicar at Divine Mercy parish in Pittsburgh. One Saturday morning Joe was running for exercise. On his route, he passed a house with both front and garage doors open and an ambulance in the driveway.

Joe told Father, "Growing up, every time you heard any type of siren you made the Sign of the Cross and said a prayer for those in need and protection for those involved. That was second nature to me. This time one thing was different. I felt compelled to say a particular prayer, the Hail Mary."

Joe wanted to stop and help, but since he has no first-aid training, he decided to keep running. As he began running again he prayed: "God, if that ambulance is still parked in that driveway when I run back, I will stop and see if I can help." On his way back, he reported, "The ambulance was not there, the house was dark, the both garage and the front doors were shut."

The following week, he went running in the same neighborhood. As he approached the house where he had seen the ambulance, a lady standing at the edge of the driveway started waving her hand as she called out, "Stop. Please stop." When he reached her, she said, "Thank you for stopping, sir. I need to talk to you. I have to thank you because you saved my life." Puzzled, Joe asked, "How did I save your life?"

She replied, "Let me tell you what happened to me last week. Alone at home, I suddenly started feeling strange and blacked out. I knew that I was dying.

But before finding myself in a hospital bed and about to regain consciousness, "I had a vision of Jesus who said, 'It's okay.

Everything is going to be fine.

You're going to be fine because this person prayed for you.'"

"On the palm of his hand was your face - on Jesus' hand!" she told Joe. "On seeing you today I had to

say, 'Thank you for saving my life.'"

"And how do you react to something like that?"

Joe mused, "I was speechless. I didn't know what to say, except, 'Thank you.'"

The second story is told by one of our Nuns. Sister's mother, who always had a rosary in her hand, was nearing death in a Nursing Home so Sister obtained

permission to visit her. Mom was discouraged and distracted. So, remembering a story her mother loved to tell, Sister asked, "Mom did you see the Blessed Mother?" "Yes, she answered. I was a young mother with four small children, on my way into emergency surgery. I was afraid that I would die, so, I prayed to the Blessed Mother, 'Holy Mother help me at the hour of my death. I don't want to

leave my babies.' Our Blessed Mother appeared to me and said, 'Do not worry, everything will be all right.'" The Sister asked, "Mom, what color was her hair?" Mom said, "I could not see because of her veil." "What color were her eyes? Sister asked. Mom paused, seemingly returning to that moment, and answered, "I don't know. All I saw was love."

Our Blessed Mother explained to St. Mechtilde that each "Hail Mary full of grace", echoes the Archangel's salutation to her on the day of the

Annunciation when she was made Mother of the Son of God. Our Mother continued, "no prayer you could possibly compose would give me the joy and delight of the Hail Mary. When people say, 'The Lord is with thee', they renew the indescribable joy that was mine when the Eternal Word became incarnate in my womb.

Dare we say, then, that even one devoutly prayed Hail Mary has the power to move Heaven and Earth?
