In a dream, Joseph was told that Mary had conceived a child by the Holy Spirit and the Angel messenger solicited his consent to God's plan: "She shall bring forth a son, and you shalt call his name Jesus." Thus, Joseph was privileged to be the first to publicly announce his name, Jesus. Jesus gave his disciples the privilege of speaking his name with authority. Can we, who believe in him, learn from Saint Joseph the qualities necessary to pray, 'in the name of Jesus' and receive the promises Jesus made to those who do?

Experiencing his own Annunciation, Joseph conceived the Christ Child in his heart. This according to Saint John Chrysostom was the Father's purpose in giving Joseph the privilege of naming his Son:

You shall be the first to call him by his name; and though he is not your bodily son you will not fail always to show him a father's love and care. I would have you name him yourself, that he and you may be more closely united. St. John Chrysostom quoted by Fr. Hugh

Therefore, at the boy's circumcision on the eighth-day, when asked by the Rabbi, "What name do you give to your son?" Joseph, by his Godgiven paternal authority said, "His name is Jesus." *REDEMPTORIS CUSTOS*, Apostolic Exhortation of Pope John Paul II promulgated on August 15, 1989, 9&12

In our modern world, we don't think much of names. They are functional, but not much else. But in the ancient world, it was understood that a name fundamentally represented the person, and knowing a person's name gave you some level of control over that person, the ability to call *on* that person. This is why, when asked by Moses for his name, God simply responds, "I am who I am." Exod. 3:14 Unlike the pagan gods, the one true God was not at the beck and call of men. He was in total control.

From the burning bush the Eternal One refused to give Moses His personal name. Yet with the Incarnation, we see God humbling himself even to be given a name and, in a sense, placing himself at our beck and call. "If you ask anything in my name, I will do it." John 14:14 God didn't become a generic "man," but a specific man: Jesus of Nazareth. By doing so, he infused the name Jesus with divine power. Then the Son of God taught us, that united to him, as sons in the *Son*, we could call the God of the Burning Bush, "Abba-Father."


In his public ministry Jesus manifested his Divine Authority over infirm bodies, sin sick souls, demons and Nature itself. Then, he entrusted the power of his Name to his Disciples sending them out two by two ahead of

him. He instructed them: "Heal the sick who are there and tell them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' Whoever listens to you listens to me; whoever rejects you rejects me; whoever

rejects me rejects Him who sent me." The seventy-two returned with joy and said, "Lord, even the demons submit to us in your Name." Luke 10: 1,9,16,17

In the Acts of the Apostles. Peter and John were arrested for healing a man crippled from birth and they



were asked, "By what power or by what name did you do this?" The Rulers of the people and elders understood that names have power, and they wanted to know what name had the power to heal. Peter boldly told them, "this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead." Then Peter went even further by telling them that salvation itself comes from this Name and that "by no other name may one be saved." Cf. Acts 4:8-12

At our Baptism, we were entrusted with the Name of Jesus for the same reason that the Father entrusted his naming to St. Joseph, "that the two of you may be more closely united." By the outpouring of his Holy Spirit, we were made one with Christ. The Lord Jesus gave us his name and accompanied it with promises: "Where two or more are gathered together in my name I am in your midst." Matt. 18:20 And, "If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ask whatever you



wish in my name, and it will be done for you." Cf. Jn. 15:7

Like Saint Joseph, as Christians, we have been called to speak Jesus' name. However, Joseph possessed two more qualities for us to emulate: humility and docility to the Father's Plan. When the disciples prayed, 'in the Name of Jesus,' they knew that the power did not come from their words but from his Person - from the infinite merits of his Incarnation, Passion and Resurrection.

Ultimately, any prayer prayed, in the Name of Jesus is spoken to our Heavenly Father. To pray in the Name of Jesus is to pray as Jesus prayed: "Father, not my will, but thine be done." Lk. 22:42 By his 'yes' to the Father's Plan, Saint Joseph became the first to call His Divine Son by name.



With the fatherly support of Saint Joseph, may we be able to hear Jesus' Plan for us to pray in his Name and receive His promises.

You did not choose Me but I chose you, and appointed you that you would go and bear fruit, and that your fruit would remain, so that whatever you ask of the Father in My name He may give to you. Jn. 15:12, 16-17

How do I become a Lay DOMINICAN?

An individual interested in becoming a Lay Dominican can be received into the Order after a six-month period of discernment and initial formation. The "novice" then enters a oneyear program of further formation and discernment prior to making temporary profession to live according to the Lay Dominican Rule for a three-year period. During this period, the "temporary professed" engages in more detailed formation as he/she continues to discern the call to Dominican life. Finally, after successful completion of formation and discernment, the individual is invited to make perpetual profession to the Order. "Perpetually professed" wear the Dominican scapular (see photo) as a sign of this lifetime commitment to live as Dominicans according to the Rule. *If you are an active Catholic* adult in full communion with the Church and are interested in *learning more about becoming* a Lay Dominican, check out our website at laydominicansfh.org.




Christ. To me the habit says, "I love God!"


